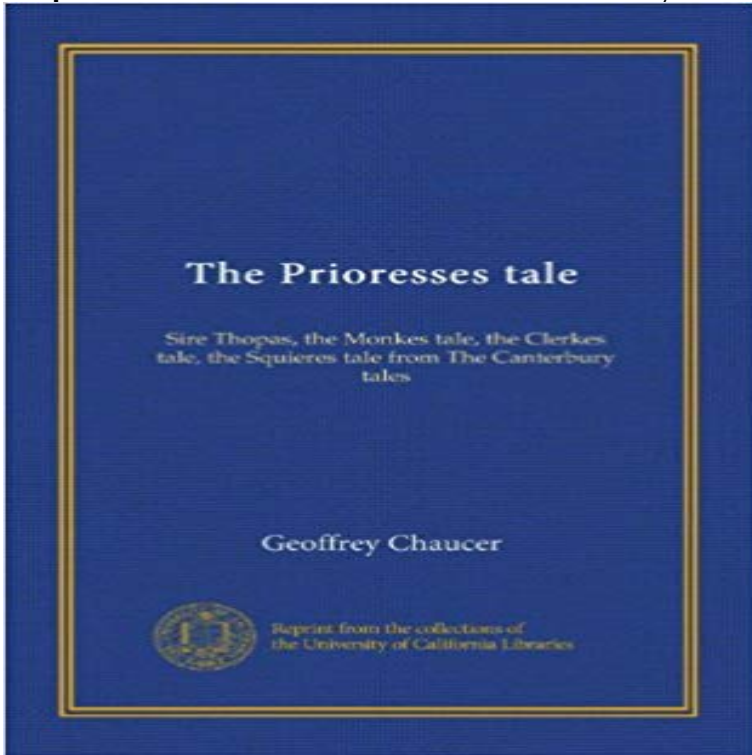


The Prioresses tale: Sire Thopas, the Monkes tale, the Clerkes tale, the Squieres tale from The Canterbury tales
