


Phaedrus

Plato, Phaedrus, section 227a The *Phaedrus* (*/ˈfiːdrʊz/* Ancient Greek: φαίδρος Phaidros), written by Plato, is a dialogue between Plato's protagonist, Socrates, and Phaedrus, an interlocutor in several dialogues.
